From the Minister's Desk

Connect *Inspire* Transform are the three suns on the horizon of Beacon's future. They point to your vision of who you want to be for yourselves and in the larger

community. When the Vision Team brought to the congregation the culmination of their work to create a new vision for Beacon, it was met with a clear and unambiguous thumbs-up from you. The Team will continue to work toward defining how Beacon can take that vision and create the steps or the mission that will guide future choices.

I have used the term 'connect' for many years, but in a slightly different context. In the actor's work, it is of the utmost importance that two people, two actors, 'connect'. In that context, to connect means to be open to the other, heart and mind open, giving and receiving. It means to breathe together. It means that in order to do the work of telling their story, the two actors must begin by establishing a bond. It is that bond between them that is the foundation of their work. I will suggest that this is true for each of us at Beacon. It is the bonds we create between us that will be the foundation of the future.

In this age of electronic communication to be connected has taken on a whole new meaning. Being connected now means that we are plugged into the net and that we surf, and chat, and text and skype and blog. Twenty years ago I wouldn't have known what you meant if you asked me to skype. Today many of us stay in contact with our families and friends through some or all of these methods of connection. As Beacon looks into its future we will need to consider what church means in this age of connection.

At the recent Canadian Unitarian Council Annual Meeting in Montreal there were many exciting conversations about the Church of the Future. Young and old were questioning the assumption that church was a building and that services only happened on Sunday mornings in that building. "What?!" you say. Yes!, even this was being questioned and explored. It seems we all spend a huge amount of time and resources creating Sunday services. There is no doubt that we love them, but what else could we do?, was one of the questions being asked.

What else could we do to 'connect' to people who aren't drawn to a Sunday morning church experience? I heard stories of an online Unitarian group, similar to our Chalice Circles, who meet regularly for worship and deep sharing. In Halifax, Rev. Norm Horofker is conducting music services in a local pub on Sunday evenings. These are just two stories of ways that we can 'connect' to each other in new and exciting ways.

I look forward to next year and the interesting conversations that we will have about how we might explore the meaning of connection between us and build new connections.

In the meantime, enjoy your connections this summer to family and friends and the world we love. Be good to yourselves and those who cross your path. With respect and gratitude, Bey Dahra Thoma

The Importance of Forgiveness

Creative Play at Camp Sasamat

On June 6-8th, several Beacon children had the chance to attend family camp at Lake Sasamat. The weather was beautiful and the children were outside most of the time. They enjoyed canoeing, archery and climbing all part of the programming offered at the camp. In addition, the children had lots of free time out of doors. Charlotte related to me how they found the carcasses of two birds and decided to hold a funeral. For bird number one, a grave was dug, a cross was made and an RIP was scratched onto a piece of wood using a charcoal stick. A water lily on top of the grave was the final touch. Funeral number two took place on the lake. The dead bird was placed in a nest, and then brought to the centre of the lake by canoe, where it was laid on two lily pads and set to float free.

Creativity was evident inside the lodge as well — one of the senior campers, Gerald Boyco, had come prepared with several skit ideas for the "No Talent" show, and the children had the chance to take part in his original and wacky productions — 1. The Case of the Cereal Killer (as in rice crispies); 2. The Extraterrestrial; and 3. The Rainbow Girls. Beacon choir members also had a chance to "play". Alison Nixon led choir workshop participants in a singing "walk about" for an unusual and uplifting experience of harmony, sound, vibration and movement. In addition, we "waded in the water" of Eastern meditation by singing "Om" together, for several minutes on end.

Toddlers and small children from the four Lower Mainland Unitarian churches happily waded into the cold waters of Lake Sasamat, letting us re-live the wonder and attraction of liquid landscapes. The older children opted for the full immersion program and jumped off the dock.

This was my sixth year at Camp Sasamat, and I appreciate the campers who come back each year, providing us with the opportunity to deepen our knowledge of—and our trust in—each other. Equally important, is the opportunity to meet new campers and create new connections. It is a gift to partake in this creative community.

Peggy had several requests for this recipe after she brought the cake to the choir concert.

Gina's Mom-in-law's Blueberry Cake:

Set aside:

1 1/2 c flour1 tsp baking powder1/2 tsp baking soda1/4 tsp salt1 1/2 c blueberries coated with flour

Cream together:

1/2 c butter and 3/4 c sugar then add1 egg1/2 c plain yoghurt1 ts

1 tsp vanilla 1 tsp lemon rind

Add the flour mixture and blueberries. Bake in a greased 9" cake pan at 350 for 45 minutes.

Glaze:

1/2 c icing sugar, 1 tbsp Lemon juice, 2 tsp melted butter

Donna has had several requests for this recipe after serving them at a few recent meetings.

Rhubarb Oatmeal Muffins

I often make this with fresh or frozen cranberries, if it isn't rhubarb season. Doesn't work with dried cranberries – needs the liquid from fresh fruit. Sometimes I use rhubarb & strawberries, or rhubarb & raspberries.

1 c buttermilk (I use Orange juice)1 egg1 tsp vanilla½ c vegetable oil2 ½ c flour1 ¼ c packed brown sugar (I use less)1 c oats1 T orange zest (I omit, because I use OJ)1 t. baking soda1 t. salt2 c chopped fresh rhubarb (I use more!)

In medium bowl, whisk together buttermilk, egg, vanilla, oil. In large bowl, combine dry ingreds. Add liquid, add rhubarb. (I add the rhubarb first, so it gets coated with flour, so doesn't sink so much.) Mix gently just until flour is mixed in.

Makes about 18 muffins, bake at 350 for 25 - 30 minutes.

Regional Fall Gathering Oct 24-26 - BC Regional Fall Gathering - Hosted by the First Unitarian Church of Victoria

Each region (within Canada) hosts a Regional Fall Gathering in a different location each year. To make it easily accessible, we try to ensure that over 3-4 years it's in every part of the region so that everyone has a "drive-to" option on at least one occasion.

These gatherings of Unitarian Universalist congregations celebrate the distinctive qualities and character of their region and enable participants to build and renew friendships across congregations. They provide participants with a unique occasion for spiritual deepening and leadership development.

These have an average attendance of 100 including adults, youth and children. A youth program, often sleeping in the church building, is run, with youth joining the main gathering at key points. Child care, young fun and sometimes junior youth (age 12-14) and/or special young adult (18-35) programming is planned. The key purposes of Regional Fall Gatherings are opportunities for:

- Training sessions in education, practical congregational leadership topics and spiritual development,
- Gathering regionally to build and renew friendships and to celebrate the distinctive qualities and character of the region,
- Participation in a CUC board "Info and Input" forum where individuals can give direct feedback on present and future CUC business and goals.

The gatherings are planned on a cost-recovery basis with registration fees covering all direct costs of the gatherings.

To assist youth in the region to attend, on your registration form there is the option of giving an additional donation to support youth attendance. Subsidies are also available for others. For more information, please e-mail subsidies@cuc.ca.
