Growing our Spiritual Gardens

The Beacon community has experienced a full year of growth and change; many of the leadership are looking forward to

some rest and some time to renew and recharge the batteries. Whether you are a busy Beaconite or just plain busy with your life, consider that your body and spirit need to be taken care of. We need to attend to our gardens, metaphorically speaking.

We need to rest in the shade of the trees in the garden, feel the wind on our skin, and the warm earth beneath our feet. We need to reconnect with our roots, nurturing them with water and silence and friendship.

We might need to rediscover what we planted this year, and take the time to see what has grown up. There may be an opportunity to weed out the habits or behaviours that have taken up too much space and crowded out the more delicate fragrant parts of our selves.

I can see that I need to take away the constant crowded pressures of 'too many details' and 'not enough time', and replace them with some water elements, like flow and trickle. I might even build a small stream in my garden that I can splash and play in. And I know I want to savour the colours. I want to create an oasis of

colour in my garden to attract the finches and bees and hummingbirds.

If our gardens are ready we can do some additional planting, or redesigning. What element needs to be brought into your garden this summer? Consider the possibilities of adding some peace, hope, healing, reconciliation, resilience, playfulness, or even a little joy.

My garden will have a labyrinth in one corner, so that I can walk its contemplative path each day, connecting mind and heart and body.

What will you include in your garden? A grove for grieving? A hiding place for healing? A dais for dancing?

Have fun in your garden this summer. Take good care of it. Take good care of you.

We will meet together again in September, to explore and grow in the Beacon garden.

From your Board Executive

The Board met for the final meeting of this church year, on June 2.

We reviewed the past year and its rewards and challenges and confirmed that Beacon is doing very well, especially for a congregation that is small AND growing.

We decided to hold an extra meeting specifically to look at long-range sustainability planning. That meeting will take place on September 1. Carol will host.

We confirmed that the annual Leadership retreat will be held on September 5 from 10 am to noon, followed by a potluck lunch. The event will be held at Jean Donaldson's residence, in her amenities room. Anyone and everyone interested in the coming year at Beacon is encouraged to attend. We will send out more information in an email a little closer to the date. If you are not on the Beacon group email list and wish to be included, please consult with Debra. The Board will meet in the afternoon, following the leadership session.

Again, adjusting to the limited number of directors to perform all the necessary tasks, Rob was asked if, in September, he would take over the task of closing each Sunday, rather than that task rotating between directors. Rob readily agreed, with the understanding that he may have knee surgery in the summer or fall and we will find a replacement for him while he is recovering his mobility.

We had a discussion about the plans for shipping large amounts of U.S.A. Coal to B.C. and either loading it on to large ships in an expanded coal terminal at Fraser Surrey docks, or loading it on to barges and shipping it up the inland waters to Texada island, and shipping it overseas from there. It was decided that Terry will craft a public statement to be presented to the congregation for anyone who wishes to sign it and it will also be sent to other Unitarian congregations in BC for their consideration.

Our next regular meeting will be on August 5. If you wish to attend this meeting as an observer, or wish to make a presentation to the Board, please let Debra know.

Sunday School Wrap-up

As the school year wraps up, I'd like to extend a big thank you to the Beacon Community for their support of the RE program.

The year started with a splash—our in-gathering/water ceremony included a water fight in the parking lot! We welcomed new students. We reviewed the Unitarian principles in the form of promises—promises that we make to one another so that we get along and do what is right. Our Christmas pageant celebrated the "Return of the Light" and reminded us to choose gratitude and peace, as we enjoyed the beauty and ritual of walking a candle lit labyrinth.

Growing attendance resulted in sufficient numbers to divide the children into two groups. Starting in January, the younger children—calling themselves Children's Community—heard stories from various religious traditions including Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism, Paganism and Christianity. The older children, choosing Seekers as their name, made talking sticks while hearing Aboriginal stories; made Kiva loans, and sandwiches for Love In Action, while exploring the concept of social justice; and learned how to knit as part of an exploration of meditation practices.

Drawing on Pagan traditions, we celebrated the beginning of summer in early May with an intergenerational service featuring a Maypole dance. Our script was based on a story by Starhawk, The Goddess Blesses All Forms of Love, and reminded us of the importance and power of love, in all of its manifestations.

Camp Sasamat

In June, many of our children had the chance to attend Unitarian Family camp at Lake Sasamat. Families from the four Unitarian churches in the Lower Mainland met for a weekend of fellowship, music and fun in the outdoors.

Depending on age, the children's program included games, art projects, archery, kayaking, wood chopping, fire building, a climbing wall and high and low ropes courses. Adults could join in the climbing.

as well as participate in a choir workshop and a writing workshop. Choir workshop participants explored jazz harmonies and learned Java Jive under the encouraging and enthusiastic direction of Alison Nixon.

The following description of the writing workshop developed in response to an exercise suggested by Franci Louann, the workshop leader... "have the feeling I'm in paradise sharing thoughts and impressions on the wide, shaded porch of Helm Lodge. Framed in green, reflecting azure sky, Lake Sasamat sparkles in the sunlight. Suddenly, stiff papers fly in a warm breeze. Pine scented air lifts my spirits. The airwaves are awash with prose poetry.'

Blessed (another bit of writing from the writing workshop)

Early morning and two families of geese permit me to share the campfire ring with them. Do they notice the sun colouring the dock and beach as it slips over the ridge encircling the lake?

I am so lucky... so blessed... I easily notice the beauty and goodwill all round me—the reflection of the tree tops dividing and merging on the rippled surface of the lake; tiny floating debris creating a fairy ice on now still water; shafts of light manifesting in the scant mist. The guardian goose has relaxed a little now, one leg is tucked up, and his head rests on his back

The hot weather, cool lake and a floating log resulted in the following adventure:

The "Rock" is "our" rock, behind Cottage X at Camp Sasamat. "Moose" is a log that has a bush at one end.

To start, we wedged Moose between our Rock, and a smaller rock next to ours—it became our personal dock. We would all walk out on the Moose Log, and after about 6 or 7 people, it would start to sink. So we would all get wet, then get off. Also it would roll terribly, so we would all fall into the water at the same time.

Next, Charlotte V., Antonio and I climbed on Moose Log and Miranda was pushing it out a little ways and then pulling it back. We begged her to push it out farther, so she did. Well, the water was too deep and she couldn't get us back. And somehow the current or the wind or a lake monster pushed us a tiny bit farther out. So, there we were, 6–7 metres out from the shore on a rolling log—feeling a bit terrified half the time—how were we going to make it back to the shore?

Eventually, the lifeguard saw us and came along in his motorboat. He said, "You guys aren't actually allowed to swim here, because I can't watch you from the beach, so I need to ask you to go back to the rock." So we all swam back to the rock except for Kieran (who had just came) and Antonio who wanted to go kayaking. The lifeguard took them in the motorboat back to the main dock. When I was back on our Rock, and the motorboat was about to leave, I called out, "By the way, are we in trouble?" Luckily we weren't.
